


Women Farmers in the United States



Issues: access to land and credit, networks, childcare, multiple roles on the farm (Ball, 2019)

"Farming is one of the most unequal professions in the United States today" (Fremstad and Paul, 2020: p.124).

Higher share of female farmers: population centers, horticultural and small livestock production, agritourism (Schmidt et al, 2021)

Female farmers & agritourism (van Sandt et al, 2019)



Less economically successful: Female AT operators "make less gross income than their male counterparts" (Barbieri & Mshenga, 2008).

Women are more interested in "expense reducing" than "income-inducing" activities (McGehee et al, 2007); Different aims (Halim, 2016)

"Attributes at the personal, farm household, and society levels predict women's perceived functional success and the importance of different life aspects to their success" (Savage et al., 2020)




Categories of Farm Exper




