

## **Cautions**

The flame-resistance tests indicate a potential hazard with the use of DEET products on flame-resistant clothing. MTDC recommends that DEET not be applied to flame-resistant clothing. DEET could be applied to the skin so long as the application follows the manufacturer s instructions. Other products meant to repel mosquitoes also can be used on the skin, so long as the manufacturer s instructions are followed.

Tests indicate that permethrin products can be used on flame-resistant clothing without diminishing the protective performance of the clothing. Permethrin is to be applied to clothing following the manufacturer s instructions and allowed to dry before the clothing is worn. Permethrin should not be applied directly to the skin.

Although permethrin s toxicity to mammals and birds is low, it is known to be toxic to fish and bees. The Missoula
